ARCHIVES

New Acquisitions

The Archives is always eager to accept new items and recently we were given a series of pages from the Hammermen of Ayr's Minute Books from circa1650/1675. NEW TRANSCRIPTIONS

Arrest book from Glasgow 20th October 1816 to 24th December 1816

The Arrest Book was transcribed by Stana Barr and her son Zac Barr with a little support from the archivist.

Glasgow was the first City to have a police force in the United Kingdom and in 1800 the Glasgow Police Act came into being. Robert Peels Police did not come into being until 1829. We are fortunate in having in the archives a book from the Old Glasgow Club detailing the arrests in Glasgow in 1816. As the Trades House used to Watch and Ward the City, we have a special interest in this book. The duties of the Police Force was rather different then and consisted of:

- 1. patrolling the streets to detect and prevent crimes during the day, the evenings and at night.
- 2. detecting house and shop breaking and theft by pocket picking.
- 3. searching for stolen goods and detecting resetters (receivers) of stolen goods.
- 4. gathering information on crimes, convicted persons and the public houses they frequent, recording it in a book for the purpose.
- 5. suppressing riots, squabbles, begging and singing songs.
- 6. apprehending vagabonds, vagrants, and disorderly persons.
- 7. controlling carts and carriages.

Some of the things that people were arrested for in 1816 will seem rather strange a frequent charge is for having a foul vent. This was a chimney on fire.

Trades House of Glasgow Bowling Trophy Presented 1897

Bowling Competition 1896 to 1930

One of the important functions of the archivist is to transcribe books of interest to the members of the Trades House and a recent transcription was that of the Minutes and Scores from the Trades House Bowling Competition ~ 1896 to 1930. This was probably the first competition, at least in modern times that the members of the House organised, and the transcription outlines how the Competition was started by Deacon Ninnian MacWhannel, after a game between the members of the Incorporation of Bakers and a rink of Fleshers.

Deacon Ninnian MacWhannel approached the Platform of the Trades House and through Deacon Convener Ramsay the Platform presented a handsome silver cup as a challenge trophy to be played for annually. (Please see image to the left).

Favourite Books from the Library

One of the books we love to have out on show for visitors is Annan's The Old Country Houses of the Old Glasgow Gentry. The Trades House Library is fortunate enough to have both a first edition (published in 1870) and a second edition of this work (published 1878). Photographer Thomas Annan is perhaps more famous for his images of The Old Closes and Streets of Glasgow. This work, created between 1868 and 1871, shows the extreme poverty and overcrowding of buildings in Glasgow before they were cleared under the City Improvement Act of 1866. Annan's work, The Old Country Houses, captures buildings at the opposite social extreme – the mansions of the wealthy. Only 120 copies of the first edition of the work were produced and only 225 copies of the second edition. An image of each house is provided with a short history. Included in the work is a picture and description of Kelvinbank House which was built around 1780. The house and lands comprising 12 acres stood on the north side of Sauchiehall Street, just west of Kelvingrove Street and was sold to the Trades House in 1846 for £19,640. By the time the first edition of *The Old Country Houses* was published, the house was in a derelict condition and some of the land laid out by the Trades House for new tenements. It was to be an excellent investment for the House. By 1878 the Trades House had realised £80,000.
